RUSSIA'S SICK RULER
Many Wild Rumors Circulated at St. Petersburg.
SOME CLAIM THAT HE IS DEAD
But That the Fact Has Been Suppressed—The Czarin Suffering From Nervous Prostration—A Russian Nihilist Intentioned—Czar's Vicar.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 22.—Despatches from public here last evening say that the Czar has rallied slightly. No confidence is held by the people in the official announcements. The meagreness of the news has left room for the craziest rumors, which multiply on every street corner in every cafe. It is said that the Czar is in bed and that the fact is suppressed in the Grand Duke's official bulletins so that the Czar's condition is not disclosed to the public. The Grand Duke's official bulletins do not dispel these rumors. The broken down ruler has many ailments. Despite the intensity of the interest in the Czar's condition the theatres and restaurants crowded with people.
In the churches throughout Russia prayers were said for the Czar. A despatch from Moscow says that the city is dispirited. Nevertheless, the theatres are open. Several parties are scouring the country in all directions and it is hoped they will succeed in locating the emperor. C. H. Sheffield, the coroner for the Grand Duke, arrived at the scene of the murder on the 8:15 p.m. train, stopping at the swamp where, after reviewing the body and surroundings, he removed the body to his home.
