The results of the two different systems stand in glaring contrast to each other. The deposits in the banks of the United States fell off 20 per cent, between May and shrinkage was only 1 1-3 per cent. Savings bank deposits in the United States during the same time declined 8 per cent, and would have declined much more but for Canada these deposits remained stationary

or slightly increased. In fact the only trouble in Canada was due to its proximity to us. It was a sort of induction from the great disturbance in the neighborhood, but Canada fortunately had the means of minimizing even this.
