The work will not only be a blessing to the community, but also endow it with a substantial amount to insure its perpetuity.

CHATHAM NEWS.

Improvement in the Thames River—Locks Closed.
 Chatham, Nov. 24.—A deputation from the Chatham Board of Trade left to-night for Ottawa to interview the Government on the matter of improving the navigation of the River Thames. An interview has been arranged for to-morrow with Messrs. Quimet, Haggart and Montague, and the feeling is that the mission will result successfully. Ald. Henry Smyth, ex-M. P., does not believe in work to maintain temporarily a sufficient depth in the channel, but thinks it would be better to wait until the Government is in a position to make a new outlet for the river by way of Stony Point, a permanent improvement, which would cost \$40,000, according to Engineer Perley, late of the Department of Public Works.

A noted labor unionist, Mr. John B. Lennon, secretary of the Journeymen Tailors' Association of America, treasurer of the American Federation of Labor, and editor of the Tailor, the organ of the Journeymen Tailors' Union, was in the city yesterday, and left last night for St. Thomas, after addressing a large gathering of the local union and being entertained at a banquet. To a reporter, Mr. Lennon expressed himself very agreeably surprised with the condition of affairs prevailing in Canada. "We are accustomed," said he, "to look upon the men on this side of the line as being unfavorably circumstanced, as compared with their more favored friends in the United States, but I find that, among our folk at least, this is a mistake. The men here are in circumstances which compare very favorably with those across the line. The latter, it is true, get more money, but here I find the cost of living is as much lower as to fully compensate them for the smaller earnings. I don't know," he continued, "but that the boys here have been for some time better off than we are. This is owing entirely to the great universal depression in trade which has existed in the United States during the past three years. This state of affairs is past now, however, as the depression, while not yet entirely a thing of the past is rapidly disappearing." Mr. Lennon has visited on this trip Toronto, London, Hamilton, Woodstock and several other Canadian cities, and reports the same gratifying condition of prosperity extant that he found here.

To-day the city hotels have evinced such a rigid observance of the License Act as probably never before was known in the history of Chatham. The presence in the city of a professional informer accounts for it all. Several of the hotel men have already been summoned for keeping unlawful hours, but a defence in each case has been entered, and an effort to convict will be stoutly resisted.

CANADIANS IN DANGER.

Congregational Missionaries Being Protected by a United States Cruiser.
 Toronto, Nov. 23.—A dispatch was received last night from Boston which stated that the missionaries of the American Board, for whose protection the United States cruiser Minneapolis is ordered to Smyrna, are those of the Western Turkey Mission. Their names and residences are as follows:

Montreal.

At a meeting of the local companies' representatives, on New York, at which the Allan, the Dominion and Beaver lines were represented, it was decided to fix the steerage rates for east-bound passengers to Europe as follows:—First class \$27; intermediate, \$25.50; slow and cattle, ships \$24.50. There is an increase of \$8 on the Canadian rate, and it is regarded as highly satisfactory by the Canadian agents.

Manitoba School Question.

Winnipeg, Nov. 22.—To all enquiries regarding his reply to the Dominion Government on the School question, Mr. Greenway contents himself with saying that the reply is being considered and will be forthcoming in due time. Discussing the matter last night, this is what the Tribune had to say:—"However, the people of Manitoba, and therefore the Government of Manitoba have come to a decision on this question. They have done that which is right, and legislated in such a manner that enduring peace will follow their efforts, and they will stand by their decision to the end. What care we for the Dominion Government and its remedial legislation? Ours it is to do our duty, and fear not. Manitobans are not cowards."
