Aids Education is Mandatory

Earlier this year the Ministry of Education made AIDS education a compulsory part of school board curricula.

of global proportions which is creating fear and increasing devastation in modern society. AIDS has not yet reached epidemic proportions in Canada but that potential exists.

September of 1987, there are 1233 cases of AIDS reported, with 254 or 21% of cases in the age range of 20-29, and 552 or 45% of cases in the range of 30-39. hundred and Four forty-nine of the 1,233 are found in Ontario. For that reason Sean Conway, the former Minister of Education, said in his statement to school boards,

"We must give young people the information and skills required to make responsible decisions about health matters so that they can avoid being infected by the virus that causes AIDS. act now, if teach we our children to make responsible decisions, we will save lives."

AIDS education will be presented in this Board as an important part of the teaching of sexuality in the total Health and Values Education programs. As part of Values Education and decision making it will be cautiously introduced and with sensitivity, depending upon the level of maturity in each class.

Let there be no mistake, we must teach about AIDS. The 'how' is at our discretion.

Education about AIDS will begin at Grade 7 and 8 and be part of various programs to the O.A.C. level (formerly Grade 13).

-Family Life
-Social Relationships
-Feelings and Values

-Individuality

- 1. provide medical and clinical expertise,
- 2. provide updated statistics on health issues such as AIDS and other health-related problems,
- 3. become a familiar contact for students who wish to discuss concerns about AIDS, other sexually transmitted diseases and health concerns, and
- 4. be available for consultation in case of a specific AIDS case.

Concerns About Cards and Condoms

In recent press reports, issues were raised about students being handed out offensive potentially cards given and To address condoms. of the some misinformation created, following the statements are made:

1. AIDS education will be taught from Grade 7 to O.A.C. levels and will follow the Ministry of Education guidelines.

2. The Health Unit will be involved in the teaching of AIDS because of their expertise.

3. The Principal and teachers will decide what content is appropriate for their respective grade levels and community.

- 4. All teachers in Grades 7 and 8, who are involved, will receive in-service training before teaching about AIDS.
- 5. The Counties School
 Committee will
 receive a preview
 of what is contained
 in the curriculum
 to be taught.

6. The cards, as mentioned in the media, were never approved by the Executive Council of the Board or intended to be used in the schools.

7. Condoms will not be distributed to the students by this Board but may form part of a lesson on methods of prevention.

It should be stated clearly that in the AIDS education program, personal values and decision making are predominent because in the end "abstinence from sexual relations" is the only sure prevention of the AIDS disease.
