We will also see an Irish mail-order bride arriving to meet her new husband in the wilds of Ontario's forests, noblewoman English encountering colonial roads, and many other vignettes of life in Upper Canada.

Parking tickets. Why you can no longer get away without paying.

Sorry, but you had better think twice about filing those slips of paper in your glove compartment.

Because new legislation means that either you pay the fine, request a trial if you wish to dispute the alleged infraction or your vehicle permit and license sticker will not be renewed.

You decide which option. It's that simple.
Should you receive a parking ticket, the ticket itself will tell you if the municipality issuing the ticket is using the new legislation and what your options are. All municipalities will be using the new legislation by 1989.
