of Dan McGrew". Travel with Service from his early experiences in Scotland through "gold fever" and the famous Yukon Gold Rush, and see a fascinating part of our history through the bard's keen and humorous eye.

CHARLES HAYTER has been presenting A TASTE OF ROBERT SERVICE to audiences in Canada and around the world for the last 19 years. Hayter's long involvement with the works of Robert Service began in the late 1960's when he was performing in a musical comedy about the Yukon. Developing this one-man show took more than three years research, including interviews with people who had known the poet, who died in 1958 at the age of 84. "He wrote of the frontier ... a Canadian frontier," says Mr. Hayter. "He was the first poet in Canada to put part of the country on the map internationally."

Everyone is invited to the show, which is sponsored by your public library, the southern Ontario Library Service, and Outreach Ontario, a programme of the Ministry of Culture and Communications.

By-Law Number 610 passed by the Township of Bastard and South Burgess states:


That no person shall park any vehicle on the streets, highways or roads.
