

Sleeping with the Enemy by Nancy Price. Sara Burney subjected to physical and emotional abuse by her husband, desperately plans to die in a fake drowning accident. She succeeds and begins a new life in a small Midwestern town. Her new neighbour Ben Woodward is fascinated by her refusal to discuss her past or to become romantically involved with him. A strange with encounter chattering acquaintance sets her mad husband on trail and mounting suspense and the final terror act releases her forever, to find peace with her gentle Ben. Child's Play by Reginald Hill. mystery, good

Below the Peacock Fan by Marian Fowler. few years ago Toronto's Marian Fowler The Embroidered wrote Tent, about five gentlewomen in early Canada. She has now done likewise for four women who were involved in the turbulent history of British rule in India, rule known as the Raj. One was a sister and three were wives of Viceroys of India, an office that terminated with the Mountbattens in 1947. All were dutiful Lady Sahibs, who sat behind their silver teapots, ' corsetted, Christian and correct and unaware of the sensuality of a larger India that lay beyond their walls. They were in their thirties at the time and Empire marked magic of gold. But as them all and cost them the dearly. With demands were emeralds, elephants and of the tunnel for Oliver crippling and his wife peacock fans, it is a Tambo. fascinating book.

The Enigma of Arrival A novel by V.S. Naipaul. This is a book about change, about a world in flux, a world losing touch with its past, which troubles Naipaul. He laments the dying of the elms, the disappearance of milk churns and rectilineal haybales, and cutting down of the old moss roses. He associates change with decay and his books tell homelessness and alienation and personal grief. A native of Trinidad, of Brahmin descent and widely experienced, V.S. Naipaul has spent most of his adult life living and writing in the south of England, where after many years he unexpectedly found himself at peace and in tune with his landscape, which he hastened to record. His writing is powerful and brilliant and enigmatic like the title.

Black & Gold by Anthony Sampson. Anthony Sampson, best known for his Anatomy of Britain series, written an assessment of the situation in South Africa, right to the end of last year, to withdrawal of G.M., I.B.M. and Barclay's Bank, following inposition of sanctions. He is at his best as he pulls together the three strands of - a shortsighted business community there for easy profit, an increasingly young restive black population and the repressive government of the white Afrikaners. He is less sure-footed when it comes to the outcome. suggests that revolution may not be far off, then goes on to stress the country's resilience and what he calls the unpredictable balance shifts, its there's light at the end
