June 1, 1987
- granted permission to Portland Fire Dept. to hold a beer garden July 24, 25 and 26th at their Fire Weekend
- passed a By-law to "Amend the Official Plan"
- applied for Liability Insurance to cover the 50th Anniversary celebrations of the Delta Fire Dept. on July 4th
- granted permission to the Elgin Lions Club to hold a beer garden at Delta Fair July 27, 28, 29th - Elgin Lions Club to be responsible for their own liability insurance coverage
- authorize the Clerk to prepare an amendment to the 5% Park Reserve By-law to read "all severances qualify for the 5% Park Reserve based on appraised value"
- approved an application for a property under the Water Abatement Program
- approved payment of general voucher in amount of \$489,283.80 and road voucher \$84,256.10
