Do you ever get "confused" when hearing of government ideas or policies? Perhaps, like the proverbial "red herring" that is the aim of those in power. If the electorate is given two conflicting proposals .. they'll be too worried and confused to object to what the leaders really intend to accomplish! (if they themselves even know) That would seem to be obvious in several areas, both Federally and Provincially.

Federal government, voice one expresses concern with the aging of the Canadian population, another voice, in then indicates a reduction of service/s which will have negative effects on that same population. An example would the proposed be reduction in mail service, both door-to-door and rural post offices.

In the Provincial arena, a recent Liberal "think tank" produced several issues relating to education: emphasising teacher excellence; revamping the system(educational) with a solid emphasis on logic, cognition and thinking skills; focusing teacher training on the child's need for self-worth and establishing requalification mandatory testing for teachers on an on-going basis.

Headlines in the same newspaper reporting the above items told of a Ministry of Education proposal which would permit teachers to teach in areas for which they are not fully qualified!

In other words, a "teacher" providing he/she met some very general criteria such language proficiency, would be allowed to "teach" just about anything, even if the subject to be taught was not in their area of

expertise. This is already taking place

(for ?economic reasons) in our Elementary schools, with the classroom teacher being responsible for music and in some instances, physical education.

This new "idea" would all encompass subjects in both Elementary and Secondary schools.

One can but contemplate the inherent problems, even dangers, in this proposal. The Music teacher assigned to automotive! While a well-tuned motor may be music to the ears of an automotive specialist, it would probably be a cacophony of noise fraught with worry over the safety of the teacher and the students. Or the Language specialist, teaching senior level chemistry. New descriptive passages prose would certainly be written when students, with a little knowledge and a lot of imagination, create noxious and possibly dangerous mixtures!
