
January 21 is our Congregational meeting with a Pot Luck supper at 6:00 p.m. - a good time for families and children. Come enjoy the and fellowship.



ALL DOGS IN THE TOWNSHIP MUST, BY BY-LAW, BE LICENCED. LICENCES ARE AVAILABLE AND DUE JANUARY 1, and the By-Law provides for penalty for contravention of the By-Law. DOGS ARE NOT TO RUN AT LARGE. The services of a dog-catcher are available by telephoning the Township Office at 928-2423. Dogs impounded are placed in Riverdale Kennels in Athens and certain fees are charged upon redemption or sale of a dog. Seasonal residents of the Township, whose dogs are licenced in another municipality are not required to obtain a licence from this Township as well, providing the licence for the other area is in evidence. Licences may be purchased from the Township Office or you may mail in the following form to:
