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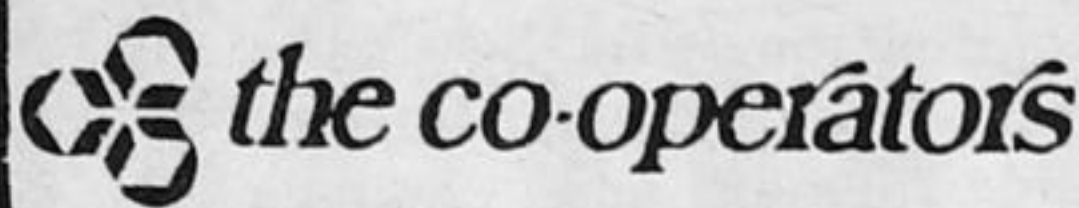
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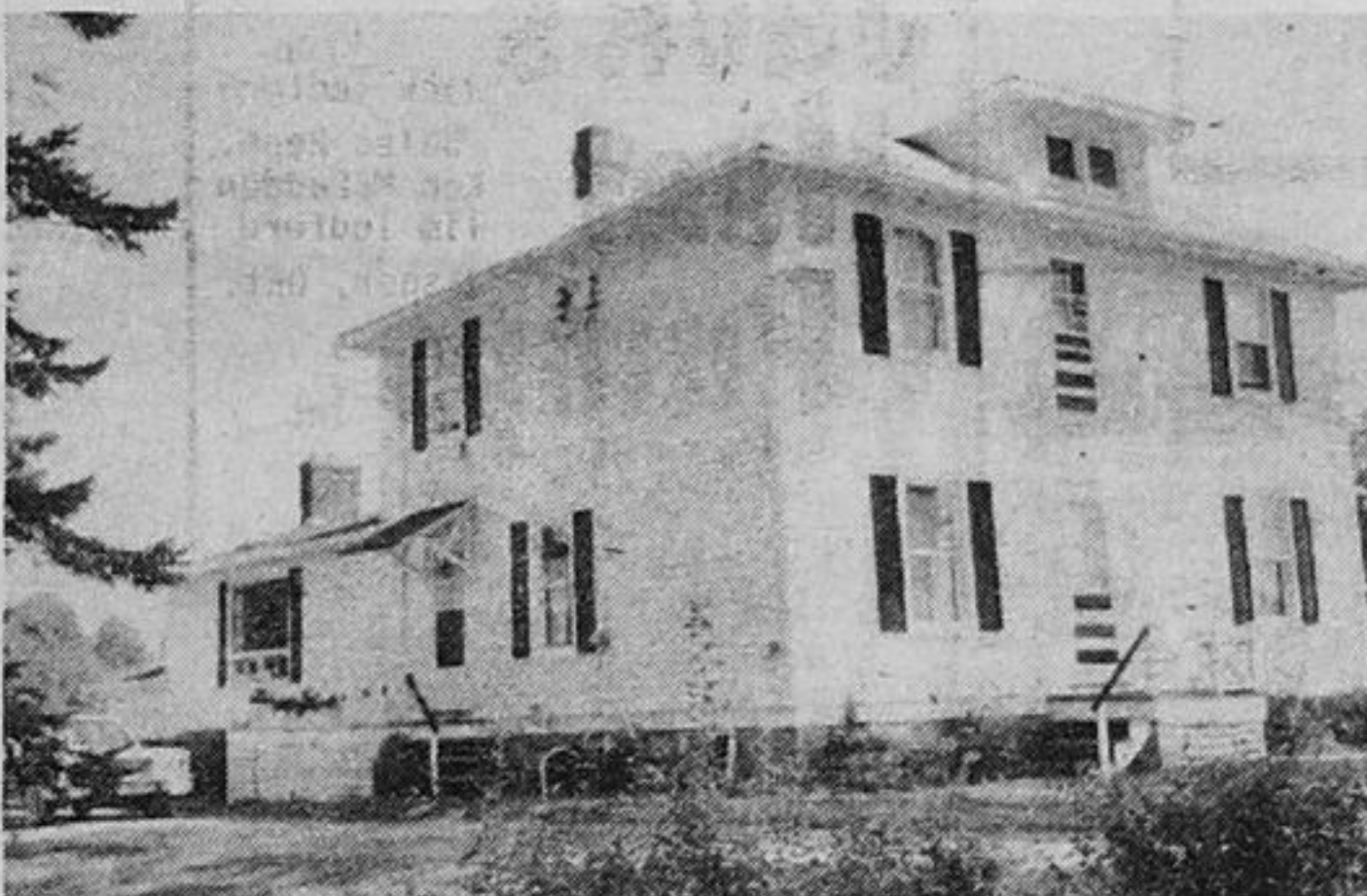

## Stadium Doesn't Need Retractable Roof

TORONTO - Toronto's Domed Stadium could be ready for the 1989 baseball season and well under the current budget, according to a Progressive Conservative Member of the Ontario Legislature. Bob Runciman, Member for Leeds and Chairman of the Legislature's Public Accounts Committee stated today that both the current budget and the scheduled completion date are achievable if Stadium officials drop their plans for a retractable roof.

Runciman charged that the Corporation's insistence on a retractable roof has resulted in unacceptable cost levels that could jeopardize the entire project. "It's obvious that costs will escalate beyond the latest 235-million dollar estimate," Runciman said. "And, recent remarks by Premier Peterson lend credence to the possibility that the project could die if costs aren't brought under control."

The Public Accounts Committee has been reviewing the Domed Stadium project and will continue public hearings on the matter in early October. Runciman, who has consistently opposed the retractable roof concept, stressed that his views were expressed as an individual Member and not on behalf of the Public Accounts Committee.

"We started out with a proposal for a 150-million dollar fixed roof stadium, now they're talking about probably a 250 to 300-million dollar facility - if we're lucky - with a retractable roof; and no one knows where the extra money will come from," Runciman asserted.

"I personally don't believe more Ontario taxpayers' dollars should be directed to the project when a major cost element, the retractable roof, is an unbelievable expensive frill that is totally unnecessary in terms of achieving the original objective - the construction of one of the finest covered sports stadiums in the world." Runciman suggested that opting for a fixed roof design would free up monies that could ensure that no shortcuts are necessary in terms of providing top quality amenities for athletes, spectators and other users of the facility. "Toronto should have a domed stadium and, if possible, it should be the finest in the world - not the most unique - and that can still be achieved at an acceptable cost and on schedule by dropping the retractable roof proposal," he concluded.



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
