Shop-lifting: A growing local problem: The last item under discussion was the growing problem of shop-lifting and the issuance of "bad" cheques. Many merchants feel the need to form a "contact" group to alert each other when known shop-lifters appear on their premises. It was generally conceded that this is becoming a major problem for several and that any merchants. if caught, shop-lifters, should be charged. most of the small businesses have limited staff and offer a variety of services, they find it difficult to watch all customers at all times.

It would appear that some groups of young people "plan" their escapades into world crime of (shop-lifting is just a nicer way of saying "theft"). Merchants intend to do everything possible to stop this problem. Customers can also assist by being on the alert and warning the the store keeper if they someone "practicing" art of shop-lifting. one store owner stated..."We all pay for losses incurred..the store keeper has to raise prices to cover his loss thus the honest citizen loses too". 
