returned or cracked are separated
and processed, put in containers and
sent to Kraft and other places who
buy the mixture for products they
make and sell.

Building Committee reported that the holding tank has been installed and hooked up.


Sports Committee reported that the Horse-shoe Pits are ready to be used.
