Children from nearby Rideau Centennial School came to visit and tour the office. The Postmaster, Pat McManus, gave a short talk on the history of the Postal Service from the time of the Persian Empire. He also told the children that history was being made on that day, and that their visit was part of it. Book covers featuring some of the prettier stamps issued during the past 50 years were presented to each child, and they all enjoyed refreshments to mark the occasion.

"Open House" was held from 3 until 4 o'clock and some 25-30 people dropped in for a cup of coffee and a cookie.

Existing records dating back to 1830 show that Portland Post Office is one of the oldest in the Rideau Lakes area. The staff have agreed to have a party every 150 years.
