

Daytown?

It seems many people hear of Daytown but don't seem to find where it is.

Daytown is a farming Community just two miles from Delta on the road to Plum Hollow.

This Community was named after Jeremiah Day who was one of the early settlers, getting his patent for land in 1801, lot 16 of the 9th concession.

This farm today is owned by Mr. & Mrs. Allan Gifford. Mr. Day also bought other lots and members of his family settled on these farms. They are now owned by Bryce Woods, Clifford Burt and Gerald Phillips.

On the farm that Jeremiah Day settled on, the first school house was built, a small log structure almost where Mr. & Mrs. Gifford's home is now. This school was burned. So after several meetings, it was decided to build a new one. So Elizah Bowser gave the land and after getting enough good stones quarried, the new school was built in 1868. This building still stands and was open but the new elementary school was built at Delta. The old school now belongs to Allan Gifford and is made into a modern Sugar Shanty, where hundreds of visitors go during the sugar season.


Allan Gifford is a great great grandson of Elizah Bowser who gave the land for the school.

Also on the farm where Jeremiah Day lived is a burying ground back quite a piece in the corner of a field. In this cemetery are buried all the early settlers of the Day families.

During the Second War, the Ladies formed a Daytown Community Club. We met each week and worked for the Red Cross, and remembered our boys overseas. On their return each were given a gold ring by our Club. The Club doesn't function regularly now but when one of our young
