Amnesty International is a worldwide human rights movement which works for the release of men and women imprisoned anywhere for their beliefs, colour, ethnic origin or religion, provided they have neither used nor advocated violence.

Amnesty International opposes torture, advocates fair and early trials for political prisoners, and works on behalf of persons detained without charge during or after the expiry of their sentences.

Its method is to organize petitions from all over the world and deliver them to oppressive regimes. The strength of the appeal arises out of the volume of mail which it is able to muster. This in turn depends upon the concern of the general public.

Now Amnesty International has called for appeal to be sent to President Idi Amin of Uganda urging him to give guarantees for the integrity of all detainees and urging him to intervene to stop reported killings. This suggestion was considered at the Newboro meeting along with another Amnesty Programme called the Prisoner of the Month campaign.

Every month the Amnesty Bulletin calls for support for three prisoners, one in a communist country, one in a capitalist country, and one in a neutral country. Information about these prisoners is provided and directions are given about the writing and addressing of letters.
