Jones Falls, the site of Colonel By's greatest achievement, has been vastly underrated for many years. The four locks provide the greatest average lift along the Rideau. The horseshoe dam was the second largest of its kind in the world when it was built - and the beauty of the surroundings is unsurpassed.

Parks Canada is focussing a lot of attention on Jones Falls these days. They have already restored the blacksmith's shop to working condition and have begun work on the lock master's house inside and out to house a museum reflecting the life of Jones Falls first lockmaster, Mr. Sweeney. Also included in future plans are nature trails, more picnic tables and parking.

At the Lantern, we are aware that there is a delicate balance to be maintained here, in order to develop the Rideau Corridor to its full potential without giving away to commercialism. Carry on Parks Canada, we are all watching intently.
