- council proposed a break down for the expenses of fuel for heating and telephone to be shared by the Garage and Offices re new Municipal Building.

- moved and seconded that Council donate \$200.00 towards the "James Auld 25th. Anniversary Bursary".

- council requests the road leading off County Road 5 be changed from the "Lost Nation Road" to "Hossack Lane", and said request be sent to County Road Committee.

- council adjourned to meet again October 15, 1979, at 1.00 P.M. in the Council Chambers.

- moved and seconded that General Voucher No. 18 in the amount of \$5727.35 be paid.

- council will petition to the Ministries of Revenues and Intergovernmental Affairs, and Hon. James Auld, that they are not in agreement with the new equalized factor, and that they request abandoning the adoption of the new factor until such time as their accuracy and the effect of their application have been carefully studied, and if the Ontario Government must change the grant structures, then the Council would like this phased in over at least a five year period.

- council support the resolution from the Town of Grimsby and correspondence be sent to the Town of Lincoln.

- the clerk is requested to register four people to attend the "Line Fence Seminar" on November 28, 1979, in Kingston.

- the clerk is to forward all correspondence and reply to a letter received from the Engineer in regards to the Harlem Municipal Drain.

- council requests an agent from CN to attend a Council meeting with regards to the purchasing of the railway bed which lies within the Park boundaries.

- meeting adjourned and will meet again Monday, Nov. 5, 1979, at 1.00 P.M.
