Gardening with Marjorie Keates

February - time to start the garden! The seed for Spanish onions, leeks, celery and geraniums should all be started this month. If you don't have a catalogue yet, the Harrowsmith Source Book - available at your local library - has a great selection of seed-houses and nurseries that mail out catalogues. Stokes is my own particular favourite because they give so much information - a good description of the plant, the number of days to germination, to maturity, excellent instructions for starting the seeds and they are prompt in filling orders.

When you're ordering seed, don't forget to order some tomato seed for late summer planting for winter fruit. Order seed that grows into short, sturdy plants such as Stakeless or Patio. These varieties have been developed for container growing and can be grown on a sunny window-sill. They produce good-size fruit - Stakeless, 8 oz.; Patio 2" diameter, dark

red fruit.

Strawberries are so easy to grow. If you are going to try some this year the variety Redcoat, which was developed in Ottawa, has a lovely sweet, spicy flavour. Choose a site with at least six hours sunshine and within easy reach of the water supply. The plants do best if there is plenty of organic matter in the soil so use woodashes when planting. Mix the ashes into the soil well. Follow instructions that come with the plants as to deth and method of planting. Mulch well with straw or pine-needles and keep the mulch renewed as it breaks down. Try to keep the blossoms and most of the runners picked off the first year. The second year, enjoy the fruit.

Parsley seeds are very slow to germinate. They can take up to 6 weeks. In order to speed them up it is usually suggested that you soak the seeds overnight and plant the next day. Then, I find, the seeds seem to stick together in a black gritty mess! Try planting the dry seed from the packet in the seed tray or flat, water, and place in a plastic bag and put them in the freezer for a few days. Remove from freezer and place in a warm spot, still in the bag, and hopefully the seedlings will be up in less than a week. When the seedlings appear, remove the bag.

What to do with your Christmas poinsetta? After the coloured bracts die, reduce the water supply and keep the plant nearly dry for several weeks. Then cut the stems back by two-thirds and start watering again. This is to encourage new bushy growth. The plant in its pot can be put outdoors next summer with your other houseplants and brought in in September.
