Tea Meeting. -A social tea meeting was held in the Temperance Hall, Wednesday evening, in connection with the laying of the Corner Stone of the new Methodist Church, under the auspices of the Ladies Aid Society. The refreshments provided were in every respect first-class, and the whole entertainment passed off remarkably pleasant. Four long tables were twice filled and replenished from the ample supplies of good things. The proceeds from this source towards the building fund amounted to about thirty dollars. At the conclusion of this part of the entertainment, the Methodist Church adjoining was rapidly filled to overflowing to listen to the music and addresses. Rev. Mr. Howard occupied the Chair, and opened the proceedings with suitable remarks. Excellent addresses were given by Rev. Mr. Miles, of Georgetown, Wm. McCroney, Esq., M. P. for this County, Rev. Messrs. Wilkinson and Cameron, and David Plewes, Esq. of Brantford, the addresses being interspersed by music and singing by the church choir. The eloquent and effective appeals by Mr. Plewes and others resulted in contributions of over \$500, (in addition to the amount previously subscribed,) for the building fund, of which we might mention the sum of \$50 by Mr. McCroney and \$25 by Mr. Plewes - the balance being from residents of Acton and vicinity. The estimated cost of the church building is \$5,000, and there is now a little over \$3,000 subscribed. The contractor calculates to have the walls completed and roofed before the close of the season.

Accident. -A serious accident happened at Douglass & Banerman's Mills, township of Esquimaux, last Friday. John Linklater, while in the act of reaching over the edging saw, had his right arm caught, and was completely through the bone a little above the wrist. It was necessary to amputate the forearm. On Monday day would have finished sawing at the mills for this season.
