Barachs in Children.
When a child's ear becomes painful, as it often does, everything should be done to soothe it, and all strong, irritating applications should be avoided. Pieces of hot, onion or fig should not be put in, nor flames should be applied, with poppy fomentation, if the pain does not soon subside. How much children suffer from these "ear-aches" because unknown—it would probably wring the hearts of those who love them suddenly to discover. It is often very hard, even for medical men, to ascertain that the cause of a young child's distress is seated in the ear, and frequently a sudden discharge from it, with a cessation of pain, first reveals the source of a mysterious attack, which has really been an inflammation of the drum. The watchfulness of a parent, however, would probably suffice to detect the cause of suffering, directed to the point as well as the object. If children cry habitually when their ears are washed, that should not be neglected; there is, manifestly, here the cause of pain. Many membranes are destroyed from discharges which take place during "teething." Whenever there is a discharge of matter from the ear, it would be right to pour in warm water night and morning, and so at least to try to keep it clean.

A Speedy Cure for Pain.
Every person should learn how to treat a fresh wound. In the first place, close the lips of the wounds with the hands, and hold them firm together to check the flow of blood until several stitches can be taken, and a bandage applied. Then bathe the wound for a time in cold water. It should be painful, a correspondent says, "I took a painful of burning coals and sprinkle upon them common brown sugar and hold the wounded part in the smoke. In a minute or two the pain will be allayed, and the recovery proceeds rapidly. In my case a rusty nail had made a bad wound in my foot. The first and second irritations were removed, and the nail was all removed by holding it in smoke 15 minutes, and I was able to resume my reading in comfort. We have often recommended it to others, with a like result. Last week one of my men had a finger nail torn out by a pair of ice-chisels. It became very painful, as it is to be expected. Held it in the smoke 30 minutes, pain ceased, and promised speedy recovery."

The Eyes.

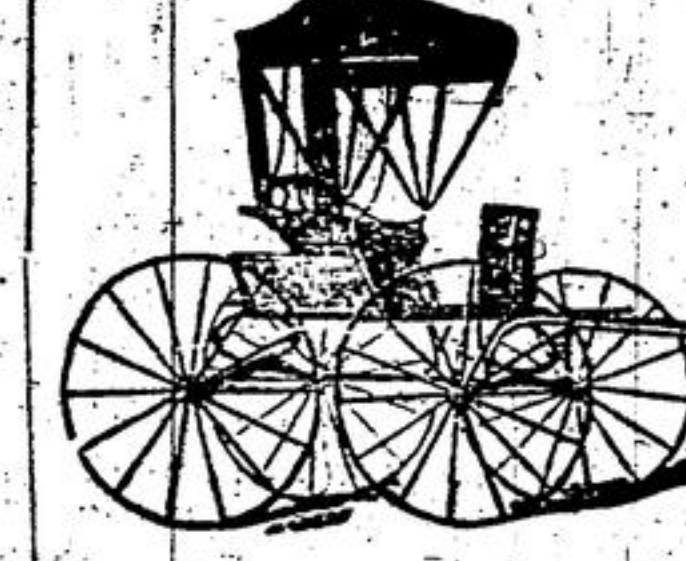
