Family Matters.
Flies.—To get rid of flies in beds, sprinkle chamomile flowers under the sheets.

Black Silk.—When the gloss is caused by constant wear, moisten the silk with a sponge, lay a damp cloth over it, and pass a hot iron over it several times till it is quite dry.

To make leather brushes to use in greasing pans, or brushing egg over tarts or pastry, boil the wing feathers of a turkey or chicken for about ten minutes, then rinse them in rapid water, dry and tie them up in bunches.

Rub fresh lard over every part of a tin dish, and then put it in a hot oven and heat it thoroughly. Thus treated, it is said that tinware may be used in water constantly, and remain bright and free from rust an indefinite length of time.

Water Stains.—To remove water stains from engravings or paper, fill a sufficiently large clean vessel with pure water, dip the engraving in, waving it backward and forward until wet through. Then fasten it to a flat board with drawing pins, and let it dry in the sunshine.

Ribbons and Silks.—Ribbons and silks should be put away for preservation in brown paper; the chloride of lime used in manufacturing white paper frequently produces discoloration. A white satin dress should be pinned in blue paper, with brown paper outside, sewn together at the edges.

Remove Paint from Clothing.—Equal parts of turpentine and spirit of ammonia will take out the paint spots from any kind of clothing, no matter how old and dry and how hard it may be. Saturate the spot with the liquid, perhaps two or three times, fill the pan with soft, then wash all with soap-suds.

Old Paper.—Old engravings, wood-cuts, or printed matter, that have turned yellow, may be rendered white by first washing carefully in water containing a little sulphuric acid and then dipping for a minute in Javille water. To prepare the latter, put four pounds bicarbonate of soda in a kettle over a fire; and one gallon of boiling water, and let it boil for 15 minutes. Then strain in one pound of pulverized chloride of lime. When cold, the liquid can be kept in a jug ready for use.
