FAMILY MATTERS.

To Keep Coffee—Keep coffee by itself, as its odor affects other articles.

Kerosene and powdered lime, whitening, or wood ashes will scour tin with the least labor.

Ink Stains from Wood—Apply with a piece of cloth some spirits of salts, and afterwards wash well with water.

Treatment of Boils—As soon as a boil becomes hard, and inflamed, paint it with iodine. The poison will not be scattered, but will be absorbed by it.

Ink Stains from Linen—Apply with a camel hair brush some saturated solution of cyanuret of potassium, and wash the linen well with water.

Care of Lamps—Lamps are liable to explode when trimming is neglected. The wick being charred, low down in the tube, the flame obtains access to the oil below.

Acid upon Clothing—When acid has been dropped on any article of clothing, apply liquid ammonia to kill the acid; then apply chloroform to restore the color.

Eating Fruit—Fruit is generally considered, and is healthful food; but it should not be eaten before meals, nor when the body is exhausted from severe labor. The skin, or peel is also indigestible.

Toothache—Pulverized alum and salt, in equal quantities, will cure the severest toothache. Wet a small piece of cotton sufficiently to make the mixture adhere to it, and insert in the hollow of the tooth.

To Beautify the Teeth—Dissolve two ounces borax in three pints of boiling water, and before it is cold add one teaspoonful of the spirits of camphor and bottle for use. A teaspoonful of this mixture, with equal amount of tepid water, and applied daily with a soft brush, preserves and beautifies the teeth, extirpates tartarous adhesion, arrests decay, induces a healthy action of the gums, and makes the teeth pearly white.

Wet Boots—When the boots are taken off fill them full with dry pine. This grain has a great fondness for damp, and will rapidly absorb the least vestige of it from the wet leather. As it takes up the moisture, it swells and fills the boot with a tightly fitting last; keeps its form good, and drying the leather without hardening it. In the morning shake out the oats, and hang them in a bag near the fire to dry, ready for the next wet night.

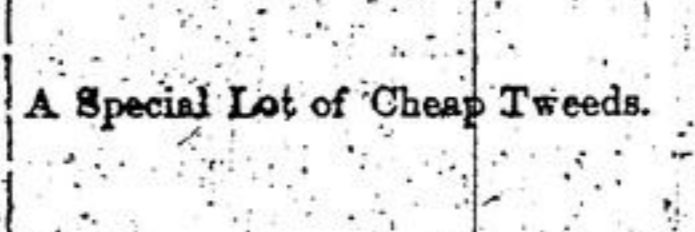

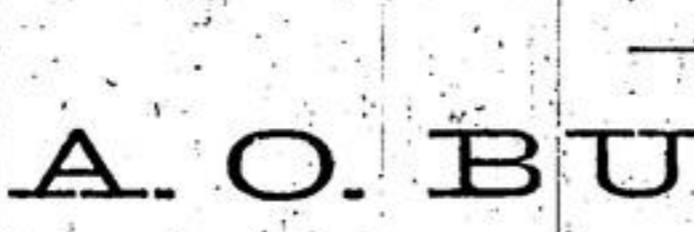

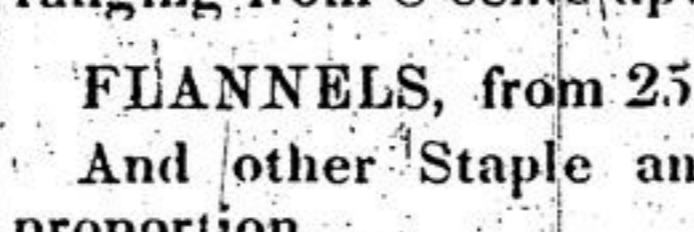
