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Daring Burglary in Toronto.

About four o'clock on Sunday
afternoon the porter of Messrs.
Foster and Haldin, wholesale

it open. He immediately sent two

burglar and keeper of an assign-
ment house, and Andrew Smith.
The admission was then forced by the

thick, separating the store from the
warehouse adjoining, which was vac-
ant, a hole was found large enough
to admit of the passage of a man's
body. The burglars made an en-
trance into the store by bars, and
then proceeded to empty the drawers
of the cash box and to break up a
panel of the back door and wrenching

place was found \$8,000 worth of
