

## LOCAL MATTERS.

Action Council.

Council met Thursday evening, 2nd inst., all the members being present.

Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted.

On motion of Mr. Christie, seconded by Mr. Smith, that we thank those who received and freely disbursed of Mr. Smith's money by Mr. Howell, the Auditors abstract and audited statement were adopted.

Mr. Christie, chairman of Finance Committee, reported the following accounts, H. R. — for payment of British funds and otherwise, \$1,071.70; Waller, credit for Dr. Maud, \$1,075.00, which in action, were ordered to be paid.

Sometime before the case was referred to the Auditor of the Council to pay the account of H. Fisher, of \$1,25, it is conjectured in the latter case of Chippeau vs. Morrow. The Reeve explained that the case was tried before him and dismissed for want of sufficient evidence to convict; that he had not taken the precaution to demand from the claimant a deposit of money in advance to cover the costs, and that the claimant had left town soon after the disposal of the case. He said that he presumed he was legally liable under the circumstances for the payment of the auditor's fees himself, and if the Council insisted upon it, he was prepared to do so. Mr. Christie proposed that each of the committees should pay a proportionate share of the amount. But this was objected to by the other members of the Council, on the score of its being a legitimate municipal matter, and should be paid by the municipality. Mr. Secord finally moved, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, that the amount of H. Fisher be paid.

Carried. Mr. Christie called for the ayes and nays and they were recorded as follows: Yes — Messrs. Secord, Smith and Hamilton; Nay — Mr. Christie.

The Reeve reported that the money that had previously been placed in his hands for charitable purposes was about exhausted; that a large portion of the \$20 had been doled out to "tramps," an almost innumerable number of whom had called upon him for assistance during the past two months. He thought as the winter was now nearly over, there would not be so great a demand upon the fund.

Mr. Smith moved, seconded by Mr. Christie, that ten dollars be placed in the hands of the Reeve to be used for charitable purposes as required.

Mr. Secord reported that the committee appointed at last meeting of Council had examined the By-laws and selected such as should be printed. He moved, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, that Mr. Hacking be instructed to print 200 copies in pamphlet form of the standing By-laws of the municipality, also to enclose therein the Auditors' abstract and detailed statement.

On motion of Mr. Christie, twelve copies of By-law No. 45, in respect to taverns, &c., were ordered to be printed on card board to be posted up in hotels.

On motion of Mr. Secord, seconded by Mr. Christie, four dollars were ordered to be paid to each of the Auditors, Messrs. Z. Hall and S. Carter, for their services.

The Council adjourned till Thursday, April 6th.
