School Board. The regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held in the school house on Monday evening, 5th inst. Present, Mr. Kennedy, chairman, Messrs. Moore, Snyder, Hall, Smith and Lasby. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Mr. Moore reported that the school committee had decided to plant twelve shade trees in the school grounds, at the rate of 75 cents each, warranted for two years. The following accounts were presented and on motion ordered to be paid, viz: P. McCann, for repairs and carpenter work in and around school house, \$1.24; R. Fisher, repairing and putting up new water spouts, \$2.50; S. Zimmerman for trees and planting, \$9; J. H. Hacking, for printing library catalogues, \$2; Mrs. Warden on salary as caretaker, \$15.00.

Moved by Mr. Snyder, seconded by Mr. Smith, that the board advertise for tenders for putting in two windows in the school house, also for sundry repairs, painting, etc. On motion, Messrs. Kennedy, Moore, and Snyder were appointed a committee to draw up specifications and attend to the proper performance of the repairs, &c. required. The Board then adjourned till the first Monday in July.
