ACTON COUNCIL. The Council met on Monday evening; all the members present.

The Council went into committee on the by-law for the appointment of assessor, Mr. Christie in the chair.

A communication was received from James Matthews, offering the use of his hall for Council meetings.

The chairman of the special committee to confer with the Trustees of the Temperance Hall in reference to joint action of the two organizations.

Claims were presented by Messrs. A. Hall, John McNeill, and W. Hamilton, for the refunding of one dollar each, dog tax, on the ground that the dogs were destroyed immediately after being assessed.

Moved by Mr. Henderson, seconded by Mr. Nicklin, that the Reeves be instructed to procure a cushioned chair for the use of the County Judge.

Mr. Henderson moved, seconded by Mr. Smith, that the Auditor be paid four dollars each for their services.

The Council adjourned till Thursday, 22d inst.

Equipping Town Council.

The members of the Township Council met on Monday, 15th inst., and subscribed to the necessary declaration and qualification of office, viz: Wm. Clay, Reeve; John Warren, 1st Deputy Reeve; J. S. Fraser, 2d Deputy Reeve; John Shortreed, Councillor. The Reeve took the chair, and briefly addressed the Council.

On motion of Mr. Fraser, seconded by Mr. Shortreed, the Treasurer was authorized to pay the following sums for losses sustained by dogs: To Robt. S. Hall, \$3, being two-thirds value of one sheep; to George Anderson, \$20, being two-thirds value of seven sheep.

On motion of Mr. Warren, seconded by Mr. Shortreed, the Treasurer was authorized to pay the following sums for fuel and attendance at the nomination: \$1.75 to John McPherson for keeping R. McLaughlin, a pauper; and \$9 to Archibald Currie for maintaining Peter McDonald up to the 18th inst.

Mr. Warren moved, seconded by Mr. Fraser, that \$15 be refunded to Messrs. Douglas and Bannerman, the taxes on their personal property destroyed by fire.

A by-law for the appointment of Auditors was introduced and duly passed. The Reeve appointed David Cross as the other auditor.

Mr. Fraser moved, seconded by Mr. Shortreed, that \$33 be granted to Geo. Lyons, for the construction of a new stone culvert on Lot 28, 29th line.

Mr. Warren moved, seconded by Mr. Fraser, that the Treasurer be authorized to pay John McPherson, \$20 for maintaining John Douglas ten weeks, from the 5th of November last, for \$26 already paid him on account.

Mr. Fraser moved, seconded by Mr. Shortreed, that the Treasurer refund to Alfred Cook \$1 dog tax, he having had no dog.

A by-law for the appointment of Assessor was introduced and duly passed, with the name of James Matthews as assessor.

On motion of Mr. Shortreed, seconded by Mr. Fraser, the Treasurer was authorized to pay T. J. Starrett \$28 for printing 250 copies of minutes and by-laws, notices of election, and 1100 ballot papers; also to John Murray \$3 for distributing ballot boxes, posting "corrupt practices," etc., necessitating two journeys over the township.

Mr. Warren moved, seconded by Mr. Shortreed, that Mr. Peter Mann be authorized to get a suit of clothes, and two sets under clothing for Peter McDonald, and send in the bill to the Council.

The Council adjourned till Friday, 23d February.
