I never expect to find nor do l-wish for a better one, either in point of simplicity, economy, or certainty. Take of good sait half a pint, of unslacked lime a piece the size of a tenoup. Put both in A stone jar. Pour into the jar two gallons of boiling water. Let it 2d stand until perfectly cold, then put in your eggs. Be sure that your eggs are all good. Care must be taken not to crack any of them or they will spoil immediately.
