Mr. J. B. Watson, who was to have lectured in this village last Monday evening, has postponed the lecture till to-night, on account of his having taken suddenly ill in Cheltenham.

George Ward, aged 20 and Wm. Shaw about 15, who say they are cousins were last week arrested for breaking and stealing a bible, bag, and willians, and stealing a bible from James Watson, of Nelson, and a book from George E. Morse, of Smithville. They each carried a rifle, and an old barbed knife. They were tried before Judge Miller, who sentenced Ward to two years in Central Prison, and Shaw to five years in the Reformatory at Ramoth.

On Saturday evening last W. S. Shaw was brought before Messrs. D. Christie and Arch. Campbell, Justices of the Peace, on a charge of embezzlement. It appears from the evidence given that Shaw was an agent of Mr. Donald McDonald, for the sale of a patent churn. Shaw had been boarding at Maney's Hotel for a short time, and had not paid anything for his board. When Shaw was asked to pay he said he had no money, but gave Mr. Maney a sample churn as security. Mr. McDonald, who had not received any orders from Shaw, demanded the churn from Mr. Maney, but was refused it, whereupon he entered an action for embezzlement against Shaw. Shaw was found guilty and sentenced to pay a fine of \$8, the price of the churn, or be sent to jail to stand his trial. A subscription was taken up among those present and the fine was paid, and Shaw was allowed to go.

THE COUNCIL met in Matthews' Hall, pursuant to adjournment, on Monday evening, 11th inst. Present—The Reeve in the chair; Messrs. John Speight, John Coates and Henry Smith. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

Mr. Speight, seconded by Mr. Coates, moved that the Reeve call a meeting of ratepayers to get their expression in regard to submitting a By-law to grant a bonus to Beardmore's tannery. Carried.

Mr. Speight, seconded by Mr. Coates, moved that the Finance Committee recommend the payment of the following accounts: H. Hunt and Dr. Lowry, auditing accounts, \$8; Hart & Rawlinson, for supplies, \$4.88; W. Maney, keeping traps, \$80; Moore & Galbraith, printing, \$15. Total \$28.63.

Mr. Speight, seconded by Mr. Coates, moved that the report of the Finance Committee be adopted. Carried.

Mr. Speight, seconded by Mr. Coates, moved that the several accounts reported by the Finance Committee be paid, and that the Reeve do issue his cheques for the payment thereof. Carried.

Mr. Speight, seconded by Mr. Coates, moved that the Council adjourn to meet again on the second Monday in April. Carried.
