FIRE

Ryder's Carriage Factory and House Completely Dostroyed by Fire.

SUPPOSED TO HAVE BEEN THE WORK OF AN INCENDIARY.

OSS \$15,000; INSURANCE \$3,500

On Friday morning last about 36-tf two o'clock the carriage works o Mr. James Ryder, corner of Mill CEORGE LEVENS. and Eigin streets, was discovered to be on fire. . An alarm was immediately sounded from the Congregational Church bell.

In a short time a large crowd of villagers assembled and took step to stay the fire, but there being soon be minus a barber. no fire engine in the Village, they had to carry water in pails and throw on the flames.
