THE MITH IN MONTREAL.

We have every reason to believe that to-morrow will be a red letter day in the history of the city of Montreal. A meeting of Magistrates was held in the city on Friday last to consider the best means of preserving peace on the twelfth, and was characterized by a good deal of disorder and confusion.

The result of the meeting was that the majority, after suppressing all feelings at variance with their own opinion, passed a series of resolutions, which set at naught all Protestant opinion and all equality of justice. The resolutions expressed confidence in Mayor Beaudry, and empowered him to take such steps to preserve order as he thought fit.

A reply has been received from the Postmaster General in reference to the petition from the people of this Province, praying for additional mail accommodation. The reply states that the subject will receive due consideration.
