The Examination of Candidates for Second Class Certificates, extending over five days, closed on the 12th July. Fifteen candidates at Milton, and three at Actonville, applied for certificates of this grade. Their answer papers will be read and valued by the Board of Examiners at Toronto. The names of the successful candidates will not be known for some time. For Third Class Certificates, there were thirty-five applicants. The under-named eighteen candidates successfully passed the non-professional examination. Miss Andrews, Emma Beals, Alice Blacklock, Emma Cunningham, Mary Jane Godfrey, Sarah A. Kennedy, Mattie Kenney, Clara Lovell, Agnes Martin, Jennie Pattison, Mary Preston, David Allan, Robert H. Cairns, John Carson, Wm. J. McClelland, Chester Ferrer, James H. Howden, Jacob H. Markle. Before obtaining their Third Class Certificates, the candidates nominated by the Board of Examiners will require to attend the County Model School, and at the close of the session pass an examination in the work of the term, together with any other subjects connected with the practice of teaching, which the Minister may appoint. No candidate can be admitted to this examination, unless he receives a certificate from the Head Master of the Model School, that he has throughout the term paid satisfactory attention to his duties, and that he is in the opinion of the Head Master, a fit person to be allowed to go up to the examination. At the next non-professional Examination, the minimum percentage required to pass in this County will be 40 on Grammar and Arithmetic respectively, 33 in each of the other subjects, as well as 50 of the aggregate value of all the papers.
